THIRD PANDEMIC SCHOOL YEAR

As students returned to school on September 9, 2021, they stepped into their third year of pandemic-influenced learning. In person learning with comprehensive safety

protocols were in place for the entire school year. Restrictions loosened in the spring of 2022 to mirror public health guidance from the Manitoba Government.

REFLECTIONS ON TEACHING AND LEARNING DURING THE PANDEMIC

"I wish you courage, although I am certain that you are not lacking it." Mother Marie-Rose's words are often with me as I walk the halls of the Academy during these uncertain times.

At first, the extended 2020 Spring Break to flatten the curve did not scare me. In my nearly two-decade experience, SMA was never closed and a pause after the busy 150 anniversary was welcome. But everyone knows what happened next.

Communication with students moved from paper, Yammer, and email to Teams. I quickly learned how to make fillable documents, embed links, create online quizzes. I was confident my teaching plans would prevail. Yes, we can do Romeo and Juliet, study Arthur Miller's masterpieces and learn the Enneagram remotely!

At first, excited students attended online classes, cameras on, even in uniform! However, with time, teaching and learning became more taxing. Blended learning (alternating in person and remote) was physically, mentally, and emotionally exhausting. Teaching in a mask was horrible. Trying to connect with masked students, or worse, digital students, was heartbreaking. Online classes included course work, but also instructions to stand up, get a glass of water, open the front door and take in deep breaths of fresh air.

Although in person full time this year, fear of the virus, mask requirements, and frequent absences affected overall spirit. Removal of restrictions in spring 2022 provided some normalcy, but normal also meant year-end exams, and new anxieties.

Students taught me a great deal during this pandemic: genuine positivity amidst despair, team building from a distance,

determination regardless of obstacles, and commitment to their SMA community. They were given an unprecedented challenge, and with the tools available to them, courageously endured.

Identifying what we lost to the pandemic is easy. Recently, I asked my grade 12 ELA students what they won. Many said awareness of self, appreciation for family, and an understanding of the inevitability and necessity of change. They also won the skills and experiences required to face this evolving world, online and offline.

I look back to the beginning of the pandemic in which I felt like I was flung back and forth every day. Before school had shut down, a group of students and teachers were set to go to Europe during spring break. I remember my mother fearfully telling me that I could not go; it was not worth being ill, forced into isolation in a foreign country. The pandemic became characterized by adverse experiences. My grades were high as ever but I was emotionally drained. Each day I would be excited to watch a movie virtually with friends, some of whom were combating intensifying depression. I knew people who came out as transgender. I knew people who lost a family member to COVID-19. One day I was attending religion class in bed; the next I was attending a virtual funeral.

The transition from last year to this year has been jarring. After the chaos of my tenth and eleventh year, I feel astounded to receive a full graduating ceremony. Leading up to my graduation, I was expecting it to be taken away, and as a result, I never fully internalized it. While the pandemic may seem over, the effects are apparent and I feel the ramifications of the pandemic surfacing as many people around me feel, more than usual, exhausted. Now we must recover amidst the problems that have arisen. I hope our community continues to learn from our hardships and evolves along with our ever-changing world.

2021-2022 SCHOOL YEAR THEME: WHOSE VOICE AM I LISTENING TO?

"The voice of the Lord is powerful; the voice of the Lord is full of majesty." - Psalm 29:4

Each school year the Academy embraces a faith-filled theme that is infused into all facets of school life. "Whose Voice Am I Listening To?" challenged our community to think about how we hear God in a world that is full of

distractions, to be intentional about the voices that we listen to, and to consider how we make decisions. Prayer, contemplation and meditation are encouraged to help one discern whose voice they are listening to.

TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION

National Truth and Reconciliation Week took place from September 27 to October 1, 2021. The Academy devoted much learning time to raising awareness, having discussions, growing in understanding of Truth, and embracing a spirit of Reconciliation with Indigenous peoples.

Over the course of two days students and teachers took part in a blanket exercise. This is a moving and informative learning experience that depicts pre-contact, treaty-making, colonization and resistance. Participants are actively involved as they walk on blankets that represent Turtle Island. As the exercise unfolds, the blankets constantly change positions, representing the changes and challenges experienced by First Nations, Inuit, and Métis people. Facilitating the blanket exercise were Elders Katherine Thomas and Florence Sanderson, as well as Tammy Rempel and Lloyd Letkeman. Particularly poignant were the personal stories from Elders Katherine and Florence.

Later in the week students and teachers participated in virtual information sessions hosted by the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation, including: We are all Treaty People; Language, Music, Culture and Tomorrow's Path; and Truth and Reconciliation Allyship.

On Monday, October 4, grade 9 students took part in a two-part Truth and Reconciliation activity: students watched and discussed informational videos on the history of Residential Schools in Canada. Thereafter, students and teachers walked to the site of the former Assiniboia Residential School at 615 Academy Road and took part in discussions and reflections.

Later in October the Academy hosted the Assiniboia Residential School exhibit. Created by the Indigenous Relations Division of the City of Winnipeg, the exhibit depicts the oper-

ation of the Assiniboia Residential School over its existence in Winnipeg from 1958 to 1973. The school was federally funded and was part of the federal government's Residential School system, made mandatory under the Indian Act. All students experienced the exhibit and engaged in reflection with their teachers.

On November 26, faculty and staff gathered for a Living Land Acknowledgement inspired by our alumna, Katya Adamov Ferguson '03. Ms. Jennifer Tesoro '96, President, and our Mission and Charism team led participants through the shared history of the land and peoples while each person created handmade art from soil.

St. Mary's Academy is situated on the original lands of the Anishinaabeg, Cree, Oji-Cree, Dakota and Dene peoples, and on the homeland of the Métis Nation. We respect the Treaties that were made on these territories, we acknowledge the harms and mistakes of the past, and we dedicate ourselves to move forward in partnership with Indigenous communities in a spirit of reconciliation and collaboration.

DRAMATIC ARTS

The Academy's Performing Arts Wing was vibrant with learning and creativity over the course of the school year. Our grade 7 students performed *Fractured Fairy Tales* and grade 9 students presented *The Diary of Anne Frank*. Grade 10 students performed *No Body to Murder* and *And Then There Was One: A Spoof*, two hilarious murder mystery farces which were suspenseful and entertaining for our first live audience in two years! Finishing the school year with live performances were grades 11 and 12 Drama students putting on a full production of Roald Dahl's *The Witches*.

THE SPARK NEWSPAPER

Jordyn Allison '24, a member of our student-led newspaper, The Spark, is researching the history of student newspapers at the Academy. Jordyn concluded, "with the Academy being one of the oldest schools in Winnipeg and writing, it seems, is in our DNA, there must be something impressive within the millions of words written over one and a half centuries." With the guidance of her teacher advisor, Mrs. Lovallo '93, and the assistance of Archivist Sr. Mary Gorman '49, Jordyn is digging up fun nuggets from days-gone-by. Jordyn is publishing her findings in a series in The Spark, with the first article published in June 2022 and with the remainder to follow in the coming school year. One such nugget from Jordyn's first article reads, "although we've become accustomed to formal articles in our newspapers this certainly wasn't the case in the earliest editions. In a section titled 'odds and ends' a student writes, "Teacher -What is your idea of a trip to the land of the beautiful?" and the teacher replied, "Scholar - a whole week with no exercise or composition."

CROSS COUNTRY AND TRACK & FIELD

The Flames Senior Cross Country team captured first place at the Manitoba High School Athletic Association provincial championship race in early May. This is the Flames' 11th provincial championship. SCIENCE

In April, Marissa Magsino '24 participated in the Manitoba Schools Science Symposium with her project, "Behavioral modification of Tenebrio Molitor (mealworms) by toxins to maximize the biodegradation of polystyrene". Over a fourweek period Marissa utilized the SMA science lab to conduct her research. Her project revealed that when higher levels of toxic compounds are exposed to mealworms the more their ultimate goal of survival and reproduction plays a role in increasing the rate of styrofoam consumption. Marissa received a Gold Medal as well as the following awards: Geoscientists of Manitoba special award; Canadian Institute of Food Science & Technology special award; SHAD Canada special award and, Best Overall Intermediate-level project.

With Marissa's recognition as a Top Project, she represented Manitoba in the National Canada-Wide Science Fair (virtual event based in New Brunswick) in May. Marissa won the following awards: Silver medal award in the Intermediate Level; Special Award: Sanofi Biogenius Canada Award, including a cash prize and certificate; Grand Award: Sanofi International BioGENEius Challenge Award.

CLASS OF 2022

On June 27, 97 members of the Class of 2022 convocated in the Academy's Alumnae Hall. This was the first year back inhouse for convocation after two years of drive-in convocations. Giving the Salutatory Address was Miss Emilia Banmann '22, with the Valedictorian speech from Miss Brooke Buchan '22, and the Address to Graduates was given by alumna and Marian Award Recipient, Dr. Leisha Strachan '92.





As the sole Sanofi Grand Award winner, Marissa represented Canada in person at the International BioGENEius Challenge held at the prestigious BIO International Convention in June in San Diego, CA (pictured). This is the largest biotechnology event in the world. The event consisted of networking events and public exhibitions. Marissa welcomed research and career advice from numerous biotechnology executives and was asked to present her project as the opening speech at the Coast to Coast Competition at the Canadian Pavilion during the Convention. Cliff Cullen, Deputy Minister of Manitoba and Minister of Economic Development, Investment and Trade was also at the Convention, and presented Marissa with a congratulatory letter for winning the Canadian competition and for representing Manitoba.

There are many voices in this world who will try to tell you who you are, but those voices do not get to dictate who you are. Only you have that power. DRINKS UNDER THE DOME






